Geneva Financial Aid Policy

- Eligibility for academic and non-need-based awards are determined at time of admissions.
- Eligibility for Geneva aid is up to 4 years (8 full-time semesters) or until graduation requirements for the first degree are met, whichever comes first. Students should complete an average of 15 credits per semester with passing letter grades or passing credit to finish degree requirements within that timeframe.
- Students must be enrolled full-time (12 or more credits)
- Geneva aid is awarded in fall and spring semesters of the academic year. Awards are split equally between semesters.
- Updated high school transcripts may be received until June 1 prior to the student's first incoming enrollment term in order to increase scholarship level.
- Terms and conditions must be accepted on the Financial Aid Portal ([link](#)) each year for disbursement.
- Students must meet minimum GPA requirements and maintain Satisfactory Academic Progress for renewal. Geneva aid will be reviewed after completion of the sophomore year and reduced to the next level if GPA requirements are not met. We do not round GPA up or down for renewal.
 - Academic Scholarships require a 3.0 cumulative GPA
 - Academic Awards require a 2.0 cumulative GPA
 - All other Geneva awards require a 2.0 cumulative GPA, unless otherwise noted
- Grants awarded for financial need will be reevaluated annually and are subject to change if financial need drastically changes.
- Students enrolled in the Business Scholars 3+1 or Cyber Security 3+1 programs will receive eligible Geneva aid for the fall and spring semesters of the 3 undergraduate years. During year 4, students will be billed and awarded at the graduate student level and therefore not eligible for grants or scholarships.
- Students receiving tuition waivers will have all Geneva scholarships and grants replaced with their waiver.
- Geneva reserves the right to revise our awards if substantial private scholarships and funds are received after your financial aid eligibility is determined. A reduction of loans and work study will be reduced first.
